We cannot achieve true community integration for the people we support unless we work to overcome hurdles to their participation in their neighborhoods, whether that includes attending community events, volunteering, joining together to celebrate special occasions, or just having a friendly chat. People living in our 28 Individual Residential Alternatives (IRAs) and supported apartments throughout Columbia County deserve the same opportunities as their neighbors.

This year's Annual Report is filled with examples of how people with differing abilities are supported by our agency to be fully included members of their communities. The Coarc Café at Columbia-Greene Community College opened in 2022. It gives people in our supported employment program both work opportunities and the chance to establish relationships with students and faculty on campus.

Our Dayhab Without Walls participants volunteered throughout 2022 with Meals on Wheels and delivered hundreds of meals to Columbia County's senior citizens. Our young people in Ability Link learned life skills and were supported in gaining work experience with our many business partners. Preschoolers at The

Starting Place graduated with the skills they need to thrive alongside

their peers in public school.

The opportunity for Terry to develop work skills, make art, and follow his dreams

Terry Shedrick has big plans for his future. He began his journey with Coarc as a preschooler at The Starting Place and now, as a young adult, he is excited to enter the workforce while continuing to flourish as an artist.

"Work is meaningful to me because it helps me to build my skills," Terry said. "My goals for the future are to work on my art skills, travel, and be independent."

Beginning in 2016, Terry participated in Coarc's School to Work program. After graduating from the Taconic Hills Central School District in 2019, Terry enrolled in Coarc's Ability Link and Community Habilitation programs. Ability Link serves as a bridge for young people as they transition from high school to adulthood. Through both programs, Terry has learned vocational and independent living skills while having the opportunity to socialize with his peers and be a part of his community.

Terry has a close relationship with his mother, Sue Ann Shedrick, who expressed gratitude for how much Coarc has helped Terry develop his independence.

"Coarc has been meaningful to our family by giving us the support and help we need to help Terry meet his full potential," she explains. "When your child is autistic, a big worry is how to help your child learn to take care of themselves, especially when they reach adulthood."

Sue Ann, a homemaker and mother of three, now has peace of mind thanks to both Terry's hard work and Coarc's dedicated support staff.

"Terry has really progressed over the years," Sue Ann has observed. "He has taken on more responsibilities at home, taking care of himself and helping with chores like laundry and gardening. Terry enjoys preparing food and Ability Link has taught him cooking skills, as well as giving Terry opportunities to develop his artistic talents."

For the past two years, Terry has participated in Coarc's Pathway to Employment program, where he continued to learn work and social skills through community activities and work assessments. In the coming years, Terry will have the opportunity to move forward to Coarc's Supported Employment program, through which he plans to begin a paid six-month internship working in packaging and shipping at Bio Force USA in Ghent. Following the internship, Terry will he climible to become fully employed at Pio Force

"Coarc's employment programs have helped Terry by letting him try different types of jobs to see where his strengths are and what jobs he enjoys most," said Sue Ann. "The job coaches have benefitted Terry by giving him job support while also encouraging Terry to be as independent as he is comfortable with."

While Terry is determined to work toward his goals each day, he also makes time to enjoy life by pursuing his passion for drawing and painting.

One sunny spring day, Sue Ann sat beside Terry at a local park. He focused on drawing intricately detailed anime characters in a notebook filled with sketches. He says he keeps his cell phone nearby to look at Pinterest photos for reference.

As Sue Ann watched Terry carefully focus on his artwork, she beamed with pride. Wrapping her arm gently around Terry, she leaned her head on his shoulder.

"I am so proud of you, Terry," she said. "I always tell you how proud I am of you."

Terry looked at her and smiled. "I know, Mom."

When Gabriel first arrived at The Starting Place, he was experiencing developmental delays. But with the help of teachers, specialists and support staff, Gabriel has thrived at The Starting Place.

"Gabriel started as a very shy little boy, but has emerged into a social, friendly, kind person who is able to make many friends," said Director of Children's Services Christine Bower-Kirch.

At first, Gabriel would only engage in solitary play. He was hesitant to play with peers or participate in group activities. With practice, Gabriel learned how to initiate play with his classmates.

During the school day, Gabriel enjoys learning. He loves drawing, has learned how to spell his name, can read the names of colors, and confidently expresses his wants and needs.

"The Starting Place has helped Gabriel so much," says his mother, Heather Rook. "He was pretty much nonverbal when he started. Then he blossomed and improved so much because of the program."

Gabriel's next adventure is kindergarten, where he will surely continue to build on his accomplishments!

Coarc Café

The opportunity for Peter to experience meaningful work and build lasting connections

Coarc Café opened at Columbia-Greene Community College in November 2022. The café. located next door to CGCC's cafeteria and open during the spring and fall semesters, serves as an opportunity to promote employment skills through Coarc's Supported Employment Services.

Peter Dunton worked at the café once a week alongside support staff. This was a new experience for Peter, who typically works at Coarc Manufacturing through Prevocational Services.

"I do inventory stuff, like drinks, cereal bars, cereals, oatmeal, chips, and the cash register." Peter explained.

The café is also an opportunity for people in the Supported Employment program to participate in the larger community. When CGCC students and faculty visit the café, the people Coarc supports can develop new friendships.

"Our family has been so appreciative of the services that Peter has received at Coarc. His work and social skills continue to improve with staff support," said Peter's mother, Sallee Dunton. "On behalf of our entire family, thank you all for your dedication to improving the life of our loved one."


Coarc's Direct Support Professionals advanced their careers through the National Alliance of Direct Support Professionals' (NADSP) E-Badge Academy credentialing program.




